More Armchair Traveling through Newcomers

IRELAND

Nan and Joe Harris

We were in Ireland from January through March serving as nannies for our daughter who was there on a work assignment. We loved Ireland but loved spending time with Carrie and her family even more. For your visual enjoyment, we have included a picture of our adorable grandson Alex and his parents, Carrie (left) and Flor.



Ireland is as lovely as the travelogues that you have undoubtedly seen. There really are forty shades of green, and it's a surprisingly temperate climate due to the Gulf Stream that flows from the southwest. We saw a dusting of snow on only one occasion. Plus, we had much less rain than we expected and it usually occurred at night.

The only divided highways are around the largest cities and the remaining roads are narrow and winding with little to no space on the sides. There are few thatched roofs although there may be an increase as they've found a way to inject a fire retardant.

The government and people are very eager to maintain their heritage. Most of the west and southwest of Ireland is a Gaelic Cultural Preserve which means they receive government support to continue the language and cultural ways. The castles, stone walls, ancient burial grounds and monastic enclaves are too numerous to mention. They are accessible, beautifully preserved and leave you feeling that the U.S. has little history.

The biggest news out of Ireland today is the economy, better known as the Celtic Tiger. Historically, the island had been quite poor but the turn around began in '95. It is

now the fastest growing economy in the European Union. The change is due to government policies that offered incentives for international companies to locate in Ireland, a young and educated work force, continually raising housing values and the return of many Irish who had immigrated bringing back experience and talents. Some statistics indicate as many as 100,000 people have returned.

There is no property tax, college tuition is free and health care is free, although there is a healthy private side which creates a great deal of controversy. In a UNICEF child welfare study, Ireland placed 9th out of the top 28 countries. The most obvious sign of their wealth is the number of holiday homes. They are scattered all over the country and number 100,000 for a population of 4 million. That worries many when you compare to Great Britain that has 250,000 for a population of 16 million. All of the above leads to an extremely high cost of living.

Of course, with such dramatic changes, there are growing pains. They have been a homogeneous society and the great number of emigrants from Eastern Europe and a smaller number from Africa have created new issues for them. It didn't feel as though the differences were based in prejudice as much as the need for additional services such as schools, health care and housing. Emigration has increased dramatically because of the high wages, the minimum wage is \$11.00 an hour, and unemployment is almost non-existent.

We had an interesting conversation with a young man whose concerns for Ireland reflected the general feeling that we encountered. They were as follows: losing their sense of Irishness (we fear that means becoming more American which means being more materialistic), a nation not knowing who they are, a lack of leaders, disappointment with their government, fears about the economy because some feel it is based in housing assets and international companies leaving for Eastern European countries where the costs are less. Sound familiar? Despite the above, they appear to be a happy and family oriented society. Most adult children live at home until they marry in order to save money for a down payment on a home. It's

Rivers:

Thursday June 28

Lower Platte River Clean-up. We'll spend the day paddling from M-22 to Lake Michigan, with an emphasis on finding and retrieving all the non-native debris left behind by other (careless) river users. Hopefully the temperature will be high enough so that diving for loose pop cans will be refreshing. This trip would be an ideal introduction to river paddling, and would be perfect for families. Canoes and kayaks are welcome. A ranger from Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore will meet us at the beginning of the trip, and will provide some extra grabber sticks, trash pickup, volunteer buttons and free parking passes for the day. Last time they even helped with the shuttle.

The Lower Platte between M-22 and Lake Michigan has a sandy bottom all the way, and has exceptionally clear water. It is the easiest river in our area, and consequently gets lots of usage during the summer months. We will paddle for a couple of hours, then take a break for lunch, and continue on downstream picking up stuff as we go. We plan to make a full day affair of a trip that normally takes only two hours. If you would like any on-river instruction in maneuvering in moving water while we mosey downstream, just ask us. not unusual for an engagement to last five years. Many homes are two generational and grandma keeps the children while the mothers work.

We were fortunate to be in Ireland during a very historic time. As you know, Northern Ireland is part of Great Britain and has not been in charge of their governmental affairs since the "Troubles". I must admit the history and current relationship between Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland and Great Britain is what interested me the most. The Troubles began as peaceful demonstrations because the Catholics had been denied civil rights.

There were not allowed to vote and denied access to housing and jobs. Sadly, it deteriorated into years of bloodshed, imprisonment and death. While we were there, the two original rivals, Gerry Adams of Sinn Fein and Ian Paisley of the Unionist Party, were elected to Stormont, their parliament. They were charged by the British government to create a power-sharing relationship or the British would maintain control. To the surprise of many, they are going forward and Northern Ireland is in charge of their affairs but it remains tenuous. Another historic event occurred when England and Ireland played a game of rugby in Croke Park for the first time in 90 years.

We loved visiting Northern Ireland. It is as safe as the South and they are begging for tourists to return. A young member of the IRA took us on a tour of beautiful Derry. He told us "this is the time for negotiations; there will not be more fighting partly because the young men of today are not as brave or strong as those that came before." In Belfast which we thought was a rather sad city, there are 26 peace lines that separate Catholics and Protestants. The major wall runs three miles; the height is 20 feet of corrugated metal with 10 feet of wire above. Derry is a beautiful city with a walled medieval center. It appears to have fewer residual problems as the Catholic and Protestant populations are separated by a river.

On a drive through a remote mountainous area, we were surprised to see two peace poles from Leelanau County. There were at a Center for Peace and Reconciliation that was formed during the Troubles and continues today.



If you are interested in learning more about Ireland today, I would recommend *The Pope's Children* by David McWilliams. It is an insightful, easy and amusing read. Also, if you're interested in extensive reading, you can find Joe's blog at www.irishgrands.blogspot.com. There you will find many riveting evaluations of Irish pubs! We covered nearly every corner of Ireland and each has something to offer. When we traveled, we stayed in B & B's which were all different but shared an eagerness to please and appeared to like Americans. We left Ireland with affection for the Irish. They are a fun loving but tenacious people who fought for over 700 years for their freedom.
